Athenian Citizen

Athenian-born men with Athenian-born parents

Athenian citizens had most privileges.

**It didn't mean they were wealthy.


They were expected to participate in government.

They had to pay taxes and do military service. A young man could become a citizen at age 20 (after military service)


Citizens viewed participating in government as a right and a responsibility.

**Only citizens could debate and vote.













- met about 40 times a year
- members make decisions on issues big or small
- members make speeches at the Pnyx
- · debate, listen, discuss, vote
- · every member had an equal right to speak
- · voting by "hands up" or by stones



- · full time government of Athens
- people served a one year term
- 10 tribes with 50 members each (over age of 30)
- · each tribe was in charge of the Council once a year
- · Council was chosen by lottery
- a citizen could serve on Council only twice
- every 24 hours a new leader of the Council was chos by lottery
- Council planned the agenda for Assembly meetings
- Council supervised the running of the government
- discussed and voted on decrees that they would present for approval to the Assembly



Magistrates:

- government official working for the court
- could fine people, or send them to trial

Jury:

- male citizens over 30 could be on jury
- had 501 1500 people
- chosen by lottery

It seems best to the demos that if there is any namecalling, particularly "shipnames" that students should take ownership for these hurtful actions by informing their parents of their behaviour, who would in turn let the teacher know they have discussed it, as well as a letter of sincere apology will be written outlining their mistake and empathy towards the situation. Based on the severity, consequences may follow.

Solutions to the issue: (Brainstorm)

Write a letter to the people involved that includes an apology and positive things you respect about them

Parents should be notified

They may have to stay in for break
They might have to do a job
Community Service

Have to do a sincere favour for those people/ that person who was criticized

Once vs. multiple times - consequences could reflect the severity; name-calling should still be severe the first time
